

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Welcome to the Evanston and Mountain View Ranger Districts Wasatch-Cache National Forest

This guide is intended to show the many access and travel opportunities that are available to help you enjoy your National Forest.

Access opportunities include a broad variety of situations, such as hiking trails, motorized trails, low standard roads suitable high clearance and off highway vehicles, and other roads suitable for most types of highway legal vehicles. Vehicles must stay on designated roads and trails, cross-country travel is not permitted - **Protect your Privilege, Stay on the Trail.**

Our intent is to provide you with a variety of access options so you can use your National Forest with minimal restrictions on where and how you can travel. However, due to the complexities of managing for the diverse needs of resources and people, some restrictions are necessary.

We have shown these restrictions as clearly as possible on the map, and posted signing on the ground where necessary to further explain the restrictions.

Welcome to the Wasatch-Cache National Forest and the Evanston and Mountain View Ranger Districts

THE EVANSTON AND MOUNTAIN VIEW RANGER DISTRICTS OF THE WASATCH-CACHE NATIONAL FOREST encompasses 415,000 acres on the North Slope of the Uinta Mountains with elevations ranging from 8,000 to over 13,400 feet.

The North Slope offers many outstanding recreational opportunities and is a popular year-round destination for almost every outdoor pursuit, including motorized and non-motorized recreational activities. The Forest Service, Utah Parks and Recreation, and Wyoming Trails Program have cooperated to develop and maintain a large network of multiple use roads and trails and appreciate your help in observing the principles of **TREAD LIGHTLY!** and following all travel restrictions.

National Forests are yours to enjoy and use for a variety of purposes. The Evanston and Mountain View Ranger Districts have developed this Travel Plan Map to show the many access and travel opportunities, as well as the restrictions, to help you enjoy your National Forest. This map is intended to help motor vehicle users enjoy public lands safely without damaging natural resources and without conflicting with other users. Motorized vehicles must stay on designated roads and trails, cross-country vehicle travel is not permitted - **Protect Your Privilege, Stay on the Trail.** Please study the map and travel restrictions for each area. To provide camping opportunities, vehicles may travel up to 300 feet from designated routes to access camping sites. Vehicles may not be used off designated routes to hunt or retrieve game.

Your understanding and observance of these travel restrictions will minimize the need for enforcement action and keep riding opportunities available for everyone.



Your Responsibility



The National Forests are public lands in joint ownership by all citizens; their management requires different laws and regulations based on local conditions. Please become familiar with restrictions by checking with local offices and reading signs and bulletin boards.

It is your responsibility to be aware of the potential risks and take safety precautions at all times when you visit National Forest areas. Changing terrain, forest, and weather conditions present a wide variety of hazards. Hazards include, but are not limited to: snow and ice fields, landslides, caves, falling trees or limbs, high or rushing water, contaminated water, wild animals, severe weather, becoming lost or overexerted, hypothermia, and exposure to unreasonable acts of other people.

If you have questions regarding the various hazards on the Forest, contact the District Ranger or Forest Supervisor Offices.

Vehicle Travel Regulations

Enforced under the Code of Federal Regulations for your safety and protection of natural resources, the following are prohibited in the National Forest system:

USE OF VEHICLES ON FOREST DEVELOPED ROADS AND TRAILS:

- Damaging and leaving in a damaged condition any such road, trail, or segment thereof.
- Blocking, restricting, or otherwise interfering with the use of a road, trail, or gate.
- Using motorized vehicles in excess of 48 inches in width on a designated motorized trail.
- Operating a bicycle or ATV, or motorcycle on a trail unless designated for this purpose.

USE OF VEHICLES:

- Without a valid license as required by State law.
- Without an operable braking system.
- From one-half hour after sunset to one-half hour before sunrise unless equipped with working head and tail lights.
- In violation of any applicable noise emission standard established by any Federal or State agency.
- While under the influence of alcohol or other drug.
- Creating excessive or unusual smoke.
- Carelessly, recklessly, or without regard for the safety of any person, or in a manner that endangers, or is likely to endanger, any person or property.
- In a manner which damages or unreasonably disturbs the land, wildlife, or vegetative resources.
- In violation of State law established for vehicles used off roads.

USE OF VEHICLES AT DEVELOPED RECREATION SITES:

- Operating or parking a motor vehicle or trailer except in places developed for this purpose.
- Operating an ATV, motorcycle, or other motor vehicle for any purpose other than entering or leaving the site.

Future opportunities for exciting travel with your recreation vehicle are in your hands so - **TREAD LIGHTLY!**

Road Closures

Forest visitors may encounter locked gates or other barriers on some roads or trails. The closures will be for one or more of the following reasons:

- **WILDLIFE HABITAT PROTECTION** - The Forest Service and Utah Division of Wildlife Resource cooperate in an effort to protect big game from being disturbed in certain areas and at certain times of the year. This might be summer range, winter range, or elk calving areas. These areas are open to use at other times when game is less likely to be present.
- **WATERSHED PROTECTION** - Some roads and trails must be closed during wet weather to prevent damage to the road surface and to protect adjacent watershed which could be harmed by sediment eroding from damaged roads. Sediment reaching streams is a serious threat to fish.
- **CONFLICT OF USE** - In a few cases, different uses of a road or trail may conflict. For example, snowmobiles might conflict with cross-country ski use on a particular road. Or a popular hiking trail might also be heavily used by motorbikes. In some instances, restriction of one use is necessary to provide safe travel for another.
- **PUBLIC SAFETY** - If travel on a road would be hazardous to all or even certain types of users, a restriction or closure may be necessary.

Good Manners

These tips and information will help you to enjoy your National Forest without damaging natural surroundings.

- Please pack out all garbage.
- Respect the property and privacy of others.
- Respect the solitude. Many visitors come in search of quiet and serenity afforded by the open space. Leave sufficient space between camps for privacy.
- The hike, horseback rider, or skier has right-of-way for reasons of safety and by rule of common courtesy.
- Signs and trail markers are for direction and use of the area. Please protect them and report vandalism to Forest Service offices.
- If you intend to build a campfire, be sure to clear a 10-foot circle to mineral soil. USE CARE WITH FIRE - MAKE SURE IT'S DEAD OUT when you leave.
- Do not cut green limbs, branches, or boughs. Protect live vegetation.
- Do not leave human waste near any watercourse.
- Traveling in pairs is recommended for safety in backcountry areas.
- Camp well away from lake shores, streams, and trails.
- Wash your OHV between trips to help minimize the spread of noxious weeds.

LEAVING A GOOD IMPRESSION

How to Tread Lightly

- Obtain a Travel Map from the Forest Service, or regulations from other public land agencies. Learn the rules and follow them.
- Avoid running over young trees, shrubs, and grasses-damaging or killing them.
- Stay off soft, wet roads and trails readily torn up by vehicles (particularly during hunting seasons). Repairing the damage is expensive.
- Travel around meadows, steep hillsides, or streambanks and lakeshores easily scarred by driving wheels.
- Resist the urge to pioneer a new road or trail, or to cut across a switchback.
- Stay away from wild animals that are rearing young - or suffering from food shortage. Stress can sap scarce energy reserves.
- Obey gate closures and regulatory signs. Vandalism costs tax dollars.
- Stay out of Wildernesses. They're closed to all vehicles. Know where the boundaries are.
- Get permission to travel across private land. Respect landowner rights.

KNOW BEFORE YOU GO



TRAIL GROOMING INFORMATION

Trails are groomed by Utah State Parks and Recreation and the Forest Service. For grooming condition updates, Call 1-800-OHV-RIDE or check www.snowut.com.

Winter Recreation Rules to Play By

This map describes winter travel opportunities from the beginning of the snow season in the FALL/WINTER when local conditions prevent travel on designated roads and trails by wheeled vehicles UNTIL THE TIME IN THE SPRING when local conditions become suitable to support wheeled vehicle traffic on designated roads and trails without causing resource damage. Closures for coming years may differ based on changing conditions.

Additional closures or restrictions may be made at any time for resource protection or public safety. To avoid inconvenience, Forest visitors are encouraged to contact local District Ranger offices for current travel information.

Winter Recreation Rules to Play By

- Play nice.** Respect the rights of all forest visitors to enjoy the beauty of the winter wonderland. Good manners and a friendly attitude will promote a safe and enjoyable experience for everyone.
- Tread Lightly and Leave No Trace.** Pack out everything you pack in and do not litter. Carry waste away from trails and water.
- Plan ahead and prepare.** Know the ability levels of your party; check on current weather, avalanche, and trail conditions; and choose your routes accordingly.
- Park considerately at trailheads.** Don't use any more space than you need or block roads and trails.
- Protect your image.** Snowmobilers, please limit your time in parking lots, avoid horse play and excessive speed in congested areas, and limit vehicle noise.
- Respect private property, designated wilderness areas, trail use signs, established ski tracks, and area closures.**
- Travel in control.** On the trail, slow down and use caution when approaching others. Keep to the right and pass others slowly. Yield the right-of-way to traffic moving downhill.
- Don't block the trail.** Move out of the way to take a break or sightsee.
- Help keep groomed ski trails in good condition.** Snowshoers, skate skiers, pet owners, and hikers should avoid traveling on groomed ski tracks.
- Respect wildlife.** Stress caused by human encounters can reduce an animal's ability to survive the winter. Do not travel in areas that are closed for wildlife protection.

UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE FOREST SERVICE WASATCH-CACHE NATIONAL FOREST

SPECIAL ORDER

PROHIBITIONS: Pursuant to Title 36 CFR 261.50 (a) and (b), the following acts are prohibited in the areas described in this Order, and on all National Forest System roads, trails, and areas, as described below within the WASATCH-CACHE NATIONAL FOREST.

- Using any type of vehicle on a forest system road where such use has been restricted or prohibited on the **WINTER RECREATION TRAVEL MAP** portion of the Order. (36 CFR 261.54(a))
- Using any type of vehicle on a forest system trail where such use has been restricted or prohibited on the **WINTER RECREATION TRAVEL MAP** portion of the Order. (36 CFR 261.54(b))
- Using any type of vehicle on a forest system road which is in violation of Utah State Law, to wit: Title 41 of Utah Criminal and Traffic Code (36 CFR 261.54(c))
- Using any type of vehicle on a forest system road/trail/area which is in violation of Wyoming State Law, to wit: Title 31 of the Wyoming Criminal and Traffic Code. (36 CFR 261.54(a))
- Using or possessing a vehicle off existing and established forest system roads/trails where such use has been restricted or prohibited on the **WINTER RECREATION TRAVEL MAP** portion of the Order. (36 CFR 261.54)
- Using any type of vehicle on roads unless such use is allowed by official posted signs on the ground or as shown on the **WINTER RECREATION TRAVEL MAP** portion of the Order. (36 CFR 261.54(a))

EXEMPTIONS: Pursuant to 36 CFR 261.50(e), the following persons are exempt from this Order:

- Persons with a permit specifically authorizing them from the effect of this Order.
- Persons commissioned by the Forest Service and engaged in the execution of a contract in the area, or road, or trail that is closed.
- Any Federal, State, or local officer, or member of an organized rescue or fire fighting force in the performance of an official duty.

WILDERNESS REGULATION: Passing or using a motor vehicle, motor boat, motorized equipment except as authorized by Federal law or regulation; possessing or using a hang glider or bicycle; landing of aircraft, or dropping or picking up of any material, supplies, or person by means of aircraft, including helicopter in wilderness areas is prohibited under 36 CFR 261.16 (1)6 USC 551).

AREA DESCRIBED: All National Forest System Lands located within the boundaries of the Wasatch-Cache National Forest as it relates to open, restricted, or closed roads, trails, and areas as designated and/or shown on the Wasatch-Cache National Forest **WINTER RECREATION TRAVEL MAP**.

EXHIBITS AND IMPLEMENTATIONS:

- Exhibit 1 - Salt Lake Ranger District Winter Recreation Travel Map, Exhibit 2 - Ogden/Logan Ranger District Winter Recreation Travel Map, Exhibit 3 - Kamas and Evanston/Mt. View Ranger Districts Winter Recreation Travel Map.
- This closure is for protection of soil, vegetation, wildlife, and other resources of the Wasatch-Cache National Forest.
- Violation of these prohibitions is punishable by a fine of not more than \$5,000 for an individual, \$10,000 for an organization, and/or imprisonment of not more than six (6) months. [Title 16 USC 551, Title 18 USC 3571(b)(6), Title 18 USC 3581(b)(7)]
- This Order supersedes any previous Orders prohibiting the same, or similar acts in the above described areas.

REFER TO TITLE 36 CFR 261 FOR ADDITIONAL REGULATIONS CONCERNING USE OF NATIONAL FOREST LANDS.

UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE FOREST SERVICE WASATCH-CACHE NATIONAL FOREST

ROADS, TRAILS, AND AREAS

PROHIBITIONS: Pursuant to Title 36 CFR 261.50 (a) and (b), the following acts are prohibited on all National Forest System roads, trails, and areas, all located on the Evanston and Mountain View Ranger Districts, Wasatch-Cache National Forest until further notice. The WASATCH-CACHE NATIONAL FOREST - EVANSTON AND MOUNTAIN VIEW RANGER DISTRICTS TRAVEL MAP describes those roads, trails, and areas.

- Using any vehicle on roads when prohibited or restricted as shown on the **SUMMER RECREATION TRAVEL MAP**. (36 CFR 261.54(a))
- Using any type of traffic on roads when prohibited or restricted on the **SUMMER RECREATION TRAVEL MAP**. (36 CFR 261.54(b))
- Operating a vehicle on roads in violation of the speed, load, weight, height, length, width, or other limitations specified on the **SUMMER RECREATION TRAVEL MAP**. (36 CFR 261.54(d))
- Operating a vehicle on roads carelessly, recklessly, or without regard for the rights or safety of other persons or in a manner or at a speed that would endanger or be likely to endanger any person or property. (36 CFR 261.54(f))
- Using any vehicle on trails when prohibited or restricted as shown on the **SUMMER RECREATION TRAVEL MAP**. (36 CFR 261.55(b))
- Use or possession of a vehicle off Forest developed roads or trails as shown on the **SUMMER RECREATION TRAVEL MAP**. (36 CFR 261.54)

EXEMPTIONS: Pursuant to 36 CFR 261.50 (e), the following persons are exempt from this Order:

- Persons with a permit specifically exempting them from the effect of this order.
- Any Federal, State, or local officer, or member of an organized rescue or fire fighting force in the performance of an official duty.

AREA DESCRIBED: All National Forest System Lands within the boundaries of the Evanston and Mountain View Ranger Districts on the Wasatch-Cache National Forest.

PURPOSE: To provide rules and standards that will enhance safety and protection of resources as they apply to Travel Management on National Forest System roads, trails and areas.

IMPLEMENTATIONS:

- This Order will be in effect when signed and shall remain in effect until further notice.
- A WASATCH-CACHE NATIONAL FOREST - EVANSTON AND MOUNTAIN VIEW RANGER DISTRICT TRAVEL MAP identifying the closure areas is attached and made part of this Order.
- Any violation of these prohibitions are punishable by a fine of not more than \$5,000 for an individual or \$10,000, for an organization, and/or imprisonment of not more than six (6) months. [Title 16 USC 551, Title 18 USC 3571(b)(6), Title 18 USC 3581(b)(7)]
- This Order supersedes any previous Orders prohibiting the same, or similar acts in the above described areas.
