The Beckwourth Ranger District of Plumas National Forest welcomes visitors of varied abilities. The Beckwourth Ranger District has been the accessibility leader on the Plumas National Forest offering universally accessible campsites, 2 trails, one boat launch, one fishing levy, three picnic areas and two interpretive sites.

Frenchman Lake Recreation Area

Located eight miles north of Chilcoot on Forest Road 178, Frenchman Lake is a high desert lake nestled in the pines. Fishing and boating are popular attractions. Supplies are available in Chilcoot.

Big Cove Campground has 11 sites that are fully accessible with table, grill, fire ring, water spigot, a level hardened pad (two sites have a concrete pad) and path of travel to accessible toilet building.

Chilcoot Campground has two fully accessible sites, with table, grill, fire rings, water spigot, a level hardened pad (two sites have concrete pad) and path of travel to accessible toilet building.

Cottonwood Group Camp has loop B that can ac-

commodate 25 people with accessible tables, grills, group fire rings and toilet building. **By reservations only.**

Enabler Trail at Big Cove Campground is a ¼ mile paved trail that accesses Frenchman Lake.

Frenchman Boat Launch has an accessible loading ramp and toilet building.

Frenchman Picnic Area has one paved picnic site with accessible grill, tables, barbeque and path of travel to toilet building.

Lake Davis Recreation Area

Located seven miles north of Portola on County Road 126, Lake Davis is surrounded by mixed conifer forest with beautiful mountain views. The Lake is well known for its great fishing opportunities. Supplies are available in Portola.

Grasshopper Flat Campground has 2 sites that are fully accessible with grill, fire rings, water spigot, paved pads and path of travel to accessible toilet building.

Grizzly Campground has 2 sites that are fully accessible with grill, fire rings, water spigot, a hardened pad (one site is paved) and path of travel to accessible toilet building.

Golden Access Passports

Passports are free and available in person at any Forest Service office. They are honored in all campgrounds in the Plumas National Forest.

Lakes Basin Recreation Area

Located nine miles southwest of Graeagle on County Road 519, the Lakes Basin Area has special geological features and breathtaking scenery.

Lakes Basin Campground has 4 sites that are fully accessible with grill, fire ring, water spigot, a level hardened pad and path of travel to accessible toilet buildings.

Lakes Basin Petroglyphs are located adjacent to the campground. There is a hardened path and platform to view both the petroglyphs and interpretive signs.

Frazier Falls Trail and Picnic Area has a ½ mile paved trail to Frazier Falls Overlook. This has an accessibility rating of difficult and assistance may be needed. The trailhead has an accessible picnic area with paved access to two tables and toilet buildings.

Portola Picnic Area

Located east of the town of Portola off highway 70, this picnic area is adjacent to the wild and scenic middle fork of the Feather River. A paved path of travel provides access to an accessible picnic table, grill and fire ring on a paved platform. Both the two interpretive signs and the toilet building have paved paths of travel.
