


Green Mountain National Forest

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Roadless areas qualify for designation as potential wilderness if, in addition to meeting the statutory definition of wilderness, they meet at least one of the following:

- Contain 5,000 acres or more
- Contain less than 5,000 acres but:
  - Are manageable in their natural condition due to physiography or vegetation.
  - Are self-contained ecosystems such as an island.
  - Are contiguous to existing wilderness, primitive areas, or roadless areas under other federal jurisdiction.
- Do not contain improved roads maintained for travel by standard passenger vehicles, except as permitted in areas east of the 100th meridian.
